Dear Parents/Guardians,

It is well know that schools are successful when they help children grow academically, socially, and emotionally. For this to happen, it is important that we provide a safe environment that is supportive and conducive to growth. By setting clear social and behavioral expectations, it is our goal to enhance our school environment.

To support our character education program and comply with Mohonasen CSD's Code of Conduct, we have initiated a discipline system called Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS). Ultimately, by adopting the tenets of PBIS into our character education program we aim to help all children achieve academic, social and emotional success.

Bradt's Character Education Program has Five basic expectations for students to:

S-Safe

T-Try your best! Ready to learn!

A-A Good Citizen

R-Respectful

R-Responsible

Your child will be explicitly taught the school-wide behavioral expectations beginning the first week of school. These lessons will highlight specific behavioral expectations in each area of the school including instructional areas, hallways, cafeteria, playground, assemblies, bathrooms, and buses.

Students will be acknowledged for following these behavioral expectations throughout the school. Students following STAR SuperPower behavior will receive tickets and classroom punch cards, which will be awarded by ALL staff. These "tickets" and classroom punch cards will accumulate and then students may use them to "purchase" a variety of activities. We will also have weekly school-wide drawings with the tickets.

Universal School-Wide Expectations

The Behavior Curriculum was developed by the PBIS Committee, including our school counselor, Mrs. Riehlman. The curriculum highlights specific behavioral expectations in all areas of the school including: instructional areas, hallways, cafeteria, playground, assemblies, bathrooms, and buses. We hope to bring a consistent level of effort toward these STARR SuperPower behavioral expectations to ALL areas of the school, ALL of the time.

This curriculum is based on three main ideas:

- 1. Children need to know what is expected of them.
- 2. Children need to be directly taught the correct way to behave.
- 3. The correct behavior needs to be encouraged and acknowledged.

Dignity for All Students Act and PBIS

PBIS helps to support the Dignity Act, which states that all students in public schools are afforded an environment free of discrimination and harassment.

- The Dignity Act promotes civility and creates a safe, nurturing environment.
- Instruction includes honesty, tolerance, personal responsibility, respect for others, observance of laws, courtesy, and dignity to include all:

 - Ethnic Groups

 - Religious Practices
 - o Mental/Physical Abilities
 - Sexual Orientation
 - Gender Identity

Children need to know what is expected of them:

In order to help our children know what is expected of them, every classroom and common area will have the same general guidelines. This will provide consistency for the students, which will make it easier for them to understand and learn each rule. It will also provide the support to all of the staff. Through our "STARR Behavior" we can address any behavior. The "STARR Behavior" Matrix will be posted in all classrooms and all common areas so that will student will become familiar with them.

Children need to be taught directly the correct way to behave:

During the first full week of school in September each individual expectation will be taught in lessons as part of the PBIS Kick-off. Some lessons will be taught in large group, while others are taught in the classroom. These short lessons will help the students learn the rules and what the appropriate behavior looks like. For example, in the hallway students should:

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For example, to teach walking feet, the teacher will explain why it is important part of being safe. The students will be given examples of situations where walking will keep them safe. Then they will take part in activities that will allow them to practice. Teachers will always model what the correct behavior looks like, so that students will become familiar with it. This will help them to have a very clear idea of the behaviors that are acceptable and expected in the classroom and all areas of the school.

The Lesson Plans were developed to teach any behavior in any setting. It is important to teach the behavior where you want it to take place. For example, teaching safe playground behavior needs to be taught on the playground. The same is true for the cafeteria, buses and other parts of each student's day. This way, students make the connection between the behavior and the setting.

The correct behavior needs to be encouraged and acknowledged:

Once a behavior is taught, the student needs to be motivates to use this new behavior in place of the less appropriate behavior. Reinforcement will be provided through positive feedback from all adults with whom the student interacts. This positive feedback will take many forms. For example, if a child is following the rule "Be Safe," a teacher may say, "I like the way you are staying safe by walking in line-up." This lets the child know he or she is following the rule.

In addition, we may remind or pre-set the students about certain rules: "Before we line-up to go to lunch, let's review how we for the STARR behavior in the hallway." This helps the students to remember the rules.

PBIS Student Recognition Plan

This year we look forward to several exciting ways to recognize, reinforce and monitor positive student behavior. Students are expected to follow the STAR Behavior Expectations: Be respectful, Be responsible, Ready to Learn, A Good Citizen, and Safe.

STAR SuperPower TICKETS/STAR SuperPower PUNCH CARDS

STAR TICKETS and PUNCH Cards will be used to acknowledge student behavior. When a staff member sees a student demonstrating appropriate behavior, they may give a student a ticket or a "PUNCH" on their card to reinforce this behavior. These PUNCH cards will be used to purchase a variety of activities. The tickets will be collected weekly for a drawing.

The winners will be announced during the Friday morning announcements. Examples may include, small toys or games, lunch at a special table, extra recess, etc. We will also plan to hold recognition events throughout the year for students and classes that reach specific milestones along the STAR continuum. More details will be forthcoming on these events.

Special Awards

In an effort to expand the children's awareness of their own behaviors and its effect on others, we have added four additional rewards for students, The Silver Spoon Award-given to the class that consistently leaves the cafeteria table and floors clean and follows the behavioral expectations. The Peaceful Bus Starr Student Rider Award will be given to the children who follow the behavioral expectations on the bus to and from school. The Character Award will be given to children who constantly and consistently display good character in the classroom, halls, cafeteria, special areas and on the bus. The Bucket-Filler Award will be given to children who display everyday random acts of kindness at school.
